

Workforce Summary Document prepared by the State Auditor's Office.
Based on information self-reported by the agency, the following items are worth noting.

Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) Employees

The agency's full-time equivalent (FTE) employee limitation increased by 2.5 percent to 487.3 FTEs in fiscal year 2012 compared to fiscal year 2011. Compared to fiscal year 2008, the agency saw an increase of 55.0 (13.5 percent) in the total number of FTEs. The agency employs FTEs paid from non-Treasury funds; however, those FTEs do not count against the FTE limitation.






Employee Turnover^a


Excluding interagency transfers, the turnover rate within the agency (8.8 percent) was lower than the statewide turnover rate (17.3 percent) and lower than the turnover rate of Article III agencies (11.9 percent) during fiscal year 2012. The fiscal year 2012 agency turnover rate including employees who transferred to another state agency or higher education institution was 9.7 percent.



Compensation Information^a

The average agency salary in fiscal year 2012 of \$72,140 represented an increase of 15.5 percent compared to the average agency salary in fiscal year 2008. In fiscal year 2012, 61.2 percent of employees were paid below the salary range midpoints in which they were assigned; and expenditures for salary and benefits were higher compared to fiscal year 2008.





Fiscal Year 2012 Workforce Demographics^b


On average, employees at the agency were 47.1 years of age and had 9.0 years of agency length of service. Of the agency's employees, 71.8 percent were 40 years of age or older, and 40.3 percent had fewer than 5 years of agency length of service.

Survey of Employee Engagement^c

The Survey of Employee Engagement, administered by The University of Texas at Austin, is an instrument that measures employees' job satisfaction and employees' perceptions of the effectiveness of the agency. Scores range from 1 to 5, with 5 being the highest. Overall, the agency's score is higher than the state average and has remained the same since the last survey cycle.
