Workforce Summary Document Prepared by the State Auditor's Office.

Based on a review of information **self-reported** by the institution, the following items are worth noting.

Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) Employees

Texas A&M University - San Antonio became a stand-alone university on May 23, 2009; therefore, it does not have five years of trend data available. The institution did not report FTEs separately until fiscal year 2012. As of August 31, 2012, 14.2 FTEs were administrator positions.


In fiscal year 2012, 28.8 percent of FTEs were paid from non-Treasury funds. Only FTEs paid from Treasury funds count against the FTE limitation.




Employee Turnover^a

In fiscal year 2012, the total turnover rate for the institution was 14.0 percent. This was higher than in fiscal year 2011, when the total turnover rate was 13.1 percent. The turnover rate in fiscal year 2012 for administrators (6.6 percent) was lower than in fiscal year 2011, turnover for faculty positions (1.6 percent) was lower than in fiscal year 2011, and turnover for staff positions (19.5 percent) was higher than in fiscal year 2011.


Turnover Rates




Administrator Separations

Staff Separations





Administrator positions include officials holding titles such as president, vice president, chancellor, associate chancellor, assistant chancellor, dean, associate dean, assistant dean, and positions with similar responsibilities. Staff positions include only non-faculty employees who worked at least 20 hours per week for at least 4.5 months.

Compensation Information^b


The average salary for staff employees increased by 0.2 percent and for administrators it decreased by 1.5 percent when compared to the average salaries in fiscal year 2011.

In fiscal year 2012, the president's salary was \$200,001. Of that amount, approximately 40.0 percent (\$80,000) was paid from Treasury funds. This salary was unchanged from fiscal year 2011, when the president's salary was \$200,001 (approximately 40.0 percent from Treasury funds).


Administrator and Staff Average Salaries

In fiscal year 2012, the institution did not award administrator or faculty merit increases. The institution used Treasury funds to pay for 100.0 percent of staff merit increases.




Of the institution's administrators, 86.9 percent were 40 years of age and older, and of the institution's staff employees, 53.1 percent were 40 years of age or older. The average length of employment at the institution for administrator was 8.2 years, and for staff employees it was 4.5 years.

In fiscal year 2012, 45.2 percent of faculty FTEs with teaching responsibility were tenured or tenure-track.


Age: Administrator and Staff
