



Based on information **self-reported** by the agency, the following items are worth noting.

Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) Employees


The agency's full-time equivalent (FTE) employee limitation increased by 11.1 percent to 10,306.1 FTEs in fiscal year 2016 compared to fiscal year 2015. Compared to fiscal year 2012, the agency saw an increase of 898.3 (10.7 percent) in the total number of FTEs. The agency also employed 71.3, 98.7, 92.1, and 150.6 Trooper Trainee FTEs in fiscal years 2013, 2014, 2015, and 2016, respectively. Those FTEs do not count against the FTE limitation.






Employee Turnover ^a


Excluding interagency transfers, the turnover rate within the agency (8.9 percent) was lower than the statewide turnover rate (17.6 percent) and lower than the turnover rate of Article V agencies (17.6 percent) during fiscal year 2016. The fiscal year 2016 agency turnover rate including employees who transferred to another state agency or higher education institution was 9.9 percent.





Compensation Information ^a

The average agency salary in fiscal year 2016 of \$55,974 represented an increase of 19.3 percent compared to the average agency salary in fiscal year 2012. Excluding law enforcement positions in Salary Schedule C, in fiscal year 2016, 83.5 percent of employees were paid below the midpoint of the salary range in which they were assigned; and total agency expenditures for salary and benefits were higher compared to fiscal year 2012.









Agency Job Classifications

In fiscal year 2016, the majority (55.1 percent) of employees were classified in the following job titles: Customer Service Representative (20.7 percent), Trooper (19.2 percent), Public Safety Sergeant (10.8 percent), and Administrative Assistant (4.4 percent).

Fiscal Year 2016 Workforce Demographics b

On average, employees at the agency were 43.2 years of age and had 9.2 years of agency length of service. Of the agency's employees, 58.9 percent were 40 years of age or older, and 39.6 percent had fewer than 5 years of agency length of service. The Employees Retirement System estimates that between fiscal years 2017 and 2021, 22.5 percent of the agency's workforce will be eligible to retire (based on data as of November 2016).



Veteran Employment ^c

Senate Bill 805 (84th Legislature) amended Texas Government Code, Section 657.004, to set a goal for state agencies of employing veterans in full-time positions equal to at least 20.0 percent of the total number of agency employees effective September 1, 2015.

In fiscal year 2016, the agency's total percent of veterans employed is higher than the statewide average and has increased since fiscal year 2015.
